Seminar in Canadian History

Fur Trade Communities in French and British North America

This seminar proposes an in depth study of the fur trade beginning in 1760 and going to the end of the 19th century. After a rapid survey of the relevant literature and the principle historiographical debates that surround this field of study, students will be required to conduct a research project based on predetermined and described archival collections held at the Library Archives Canada or fur trade focused microfilm collections held at Morisset library uOttawa. The holdings available for student projects include those of the Hudson's Bay Company, North West Company and the American Fur Company [AFC]. Catalogue descriptions of these collections will be made available to you in class. The St. Louis, Missouri based fur trade microfilmed documents, including the family papers of the dominant fur trading Chouteau Family, are now available at Morisset Library (microfilm room). A catalogue description has been made available to you in the course pack. Also available at Morisset Library are the Ste-Genevieve Missouri notarial collection. This French settlement on the banks of the Mississippi River was an active center of fur trading activities. We also have the microfilm collections of the Kaskaskia settlement, of the fur trader Pierre Menard, the microfilmed papers of Papers of Henry Hastings Sibley : fur trader, politician, and general, the Church Missionary Papers (North West

America 1821-1880). A recent addition to the Morisset Microfilm collection has been the 617 reels of the Western Americana: frontier history of the trans-Mississippi west, 1550-1900. Some collection are also available online. For example the John Jacob Astor letter books held at the Baker Library, The St. Louis Circuit Court Fur Trade Cases (1800-1834). Also on line from LAC are Metis Scrip files with affidavits and supporting documents. The possibilities are near endless. The aim of this course is to familiarize students with the enormous research potential of these relatively underused collections. To reach this objective each student will undertake a research project based on archival/ primary documents on a clearly defined subject. A whole series of specific fur trade archival holdings and research subjects are proposed to you in the following pages. Also included are relevant historiographical articles and book chapters for easy reference. No prior knowledge of this period or this subject is needed to succeed in this course.

***Le monde du travail canadien dans une

Étude de divers aspects de l'expérience des travailleurs: conditions de travail et de vie ; rapports intergénérationnels et de genre ; relations ethniques et de race; marchés du travail; mutualisme et coopératisme; les ouvriers et l'État. Ce séminaire adopte une perspective continentale mettant en relief la mobilité, les transferts d'expérience et la collaboration interrégionale. La revue de l'historiographie comprendra les travaux des historiens économistes qualifiés d'institutionnalistes, de post-institutionnalistes, des tenants de la théorie de la segmentation et des marchés internes, etc., et les écrits influencés par l'histoire marxiste et l'histoire sociale.
