<u>1918: THE IMPACT OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR ON CANADA</u>		
One hundred years ago war raged in Europe. Canadian troops began the year locked in the stalemate of the trenches on the Western Front but by the end of the war they pushed the frontline back to where the war began. In Canada a controversial election led to the enacting of conscription and curtailing of civil liberties which left the country divided. This course will examine the influence that the last year of the war had on Canada. Using primary and secondary sources we will explore the cultural, political, military, and human impact that fateful year had on Canadians.

<p><u>MICROHISTORY RESEARCH</u></p> <p>Holmes to Watson: "Never trust to general impressions, my boy, but concentrate yourself upon the details. " Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, "The Bascombe Valley Mystery"</p> <p>(quoted in Ed Muir Observing trifles)</p> <p>Microhistory is a particular methodological approach to the study and writing of history. The aim of microhistory is to present especially peculiar moments in the past by focusing on the lives and activities of a discrete person or group of people. By illuminating the trials and tribulations of ordinary people in their everyday lives, microhistory aims to show both the extent of and the limits upon human agency, i.e. the ability of individuals to make meaningful choices and undertake meaningful actions in their lives. By analyzing what might often seem to modern readers as strange and bizarre events and socially marginal peoples, microhistory offers a more inclusive understanding of who and what matters within the discipline of history.</p> <p>This seminar will survey the different approaches to the practice of microhistory. It will also examine the various intellectual and methodological debates surrounding it. Students will be introduced to some of the key books and articles that have helped shape microhistory. However, the bulk of the seminar will be spent with students defining, elaborating and carrying through a small (online)archival-based research project using microhistory as their methodological and conceptual approach. Each student will choose and analyse a 'famous' trial, and the documents it generated, to try and understand a society, its people at a specific key juncture. These trials will be chosen from the online 'Famous Trials': "the Web's largest and most visited collection of original essays, trial transcripts and exhibits, maps, images, and other materials relating to the greatest trials in world history". The analysis of their chosen trial will allow students to test the relative strength and weaknesses of microhistory as a conceptual and methodological approach.</p>

HIS 4397 A00	Seminar in European History	(3,0,0) 3 cr.
<p><u>EUROPE PLAGUED: BLACK DEATH TO PLAGUE OF MARSEILLE</u></p> <p>Exploring human experience through the lens of the plague opens us to a surprising variety of histories. The Black Death (1347–53) was the most lethal recorded epidemic in human history, causing widespread catastrophe across Eurasia and Northern Africa. Devastating outbreaks then recurred frequently over the following three and a half centuries, culminating in the last major epidemic in Western Europe in Marseilles (1720–22). This course will survey people’s ongoing experiences with the disease, and their adoption of ideas and practices to understand and combat it. We will examine the plague’s notable effects on European artistic, literary, religious, governmental, and medical-scientific history. We will also examine how modern scientific discoveries are now reshaping historians’ understanding of the plague. The seminar will focus on analysing a wide range of primary textual and artistic sources, including eyewitness and survivor accounts (as well as historical retrospective narratives); medical, religious, and political treatises; and art and architecture across several centuries. Students will also learn the value of interdisciplinarity by being exposed to recent scientific literature on the evolution of the plague pathogen and understanding its relevance to historical study.</p>
