Descriptions of the Spring courses

HIS1111 A00 (3 units)

The Twentieth-Century World from 1945

A course of general interest, which focuses on the search for security and independence in a post-war world dominated by super powers and globalization.

HIS2351 A00 (3 units)

Selected Topics in Contemporary History

The world in crisis, 1900-1945

This course aims to introduce students to the political, economic and military history of the world's great powers from the beginning of the 20th century until the end of the Second World War. The major themes we will study include the causes and consequences of both World Wars, the emergence of the United States and Japan as great powers, the Russian Revolution and the birth of the Soviet Union, and the causes and consequences of European imperialism in Africa and Asia.

HIS3301 A00 (3 units)

History Across Borders

Slavery and Anti-slavery in Global History.

This course takes a longue durée and global approach to the history of slavery and of struggles to end it. Notwithstanding slavery's ancient character, we will focus on the period from 1500 to the present. Among the topics included: conceptual and historiographic debates on the meanings and significance of slavery; different forms of enslavement and their relationship to specific historical contexts; perspectives of enslaved people and masters; resistance and abolition; and moments and eras of expansion, decline and transformation in slavery.

This course explores problems and issues that cut across spatial, temporal, and disciplinary boundaries. Study of historical connections and processes. Examination of various national experiences within a transregional context. Coursework and assignments will provide students concrete opportunities to practice interdisciplinary learning and research.

What Is Europe? (16th-21th Century)

Long-term study of the changing nature of Europe, through geographical, political, economic, and cultural aspects.

Technology, Society and Environment Since 1800

Examination of the role of technology in social, economic and environmental change in industrial and "post-industrial" society.

Seminar in Canadian History

The Indian Act

The Canadian government first passed the consolidated Indian Act 1876 as the principal statute through which it governs First Nations communities. This seminar course considers how the Indian Act came to be, how it evolved over time, how First Nations attempted to shape it, and how they have been impacted by it. Students will read different iterations of the Indian Act itself, as well as a variety of texts that situate the Indian Act in Canadian history and in the global history of Indigenous dispossession and settler colonialism. Students will take an active part in leading discussions and will write an article-length research paper using primary sources.

Séminaire en histoire de l'Asie

Récits coloniaux et postcoloniaux. Les expériences vécues de la colonisation en Asie

Le cours a pour but d'analyser et d'étudier des récits pour décrire, expliquer, condamner, ou critiquer l'expérience coloniale et postcoloniale en Asie. Pour ce faire, nous analyserons diverses formes de récits tels que des reportages, des romans, de la propagande, des films et des essais. Les récits seront étudiés dans leurs contextes historiques respectifs et nous tenterons d'évaluer comment ces sources peuvent nous informer sur les expériences vécues durant la colonisation en Asie au XXe siècle.
